1. Origin and History: The Sign of the Cross Through the Centuries

The cross has always been seen as a defense against the devil, following St. Paul’s teaching:

“For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.” (1 Corinthians 1:18).



In Catholic tradition, the cross is a sign of victory over sin and death, which is why invoking it holds special power.

2. Explanation of Each Phrase: A Path of Protection and Faith

A) “By the sign of the Holy Cross”

This first phrase reminds us that the cross is more than just a symbol; it is the mark of our salvation. Jesus sanctified this sign with His own blood, transforming it from an instrument of torture into the supreme emblem of love and redemption.

Tracing the cross over our bodies is a silent proclamation of our faith, a recognition that we belong to Christ. By doing so, we cover ourselves with His grace and remember that our entire lives must be marked by the cross.

B) “From our enemies”

This expression does not refer only to human enemies but primarily to our spiritual enemies: sin, the devil, and temptations. The cross is our defense against them, reminding us of Christ’s words:

“In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world.” (John 16:33).

By invoking the cross, we acknowledge our weakness and ask for God’s help in resisting the forces of evil.

C) “Deliver us, Lord”

Here we make a direct plea to God, recognizing that only in Him do we find true protection and salvation. This phrase echoes the *Our Father*:



“Deliver us from evil.” (Matthew 6:13).

It is an act of trust in His power and merciful love.

D) “Our God”

This conclusion reaffirms our relationship with God. We do not invoke a distant being but our Heavenly Father—the God who created us, loves us, and protects us. By proclaiming Him as “our” God, we renew our commitment to Him, remembering that we belong to Him and that He watches over us.

3. Why Make the Sign of the Cross at the Beginning of Prayer?

The cross is the threshold that opens us to the mystery of God. When we make the Sign of the Cross:

1. **We invoke the presence of the Holy Trinity** (in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit).
2. **We place ourselves under Christ’s protection** and remember that our faith is founded on His sacrifice.
3. **We sanctify our bodies** by marking them with the sign of divine love.
4. **We renew our baptismal promises**, for in Baptism we were marked with the cross.

The custom of beginning prayer with this sign helps us enter into God’s presence with reverence and faith.

4. The Importance of This Gesture Today

We live in a world where faith is constantly challenged. Making the Sign of the Cross with awareness and devotion is a silent yet powerful testimony of our Christian identity.



In times of tribulation, illness, or danger, this small gesture is a refuge of strength. Parents who bless their children with the cross pass on an invaluable spiritual heritage.

The saints understood its power: St. John Vianney said that the devil flees at the sight of the cross, and St. Teresa of Ávila used it as a shield in her spiritual battles.

If we rediscover the richness of this gesture, our spiritual lives will be strengthened. It is not a mere habit; it is an act of faith that connects us to the history of salvation.
