



Introduction: Between Fear and Faith

Objects, on the other hand, **do not have a soul or will**, and therefore **cannot be possessed** in the same way people can. However, this does not mean that they cannot be **used as instruments by the devil** to tempt, confuse, or cause spiritual disturbance.

2. Superstition and “Cursed” Objects: A Real Danger, But Not as You Think

In paragraph **2111**, the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* states clearly:

“Superstition is the deviation of religious feeling and of the practices this feeling imposes. It can even affect the worship we



offer the true God, for example, when one attributes an importance in some way magical to certain practices otherwise lawful or necessary.”

This includes:

- **Amulets**
- **Talismans**
- **“Protective” dolls**
- **Ritual objects not rooted in the Christian faith**
- **Practices such as tarot, ouija boards, or “energy” rituals**

The real danger **is not that the object has “powers”**, but that we, by attributing spiritual power to it, **open our hearts to the enemy**.

□ **In summary:** The devil doesn’t need to “possess” an object to harm us. It’s enough that he uses it to deceive us, to shift our trust away from God, and to draw us into the realm of the occult.

3. What About Real-Life Stories? Can an Object “Affect” Us Spiritually?

There are testimonies —some documented by exorcists— in which certain objects seem to have been **used in satanic rituals or explicitly cursed with evil intent**. In those cases, the objects may act as **“doors” or “remnants”** of a consecration to evil.

Father Gabriele Amorth, the famous exorcist of Rome, used to say:

“The devil does not possess objects, but he can cling to them when they have been used for satanic purposes or demonic invocation.”

In these cases, the Church recommends the **blessing of the object**, or its **destruction**, according to spiritual discernment. **Not out of fear**, but as an act of purification and closure to any door that was opened voluntarily to evil.



4. What Does the Bible Say About Objects Used for Evil?

Sacred Scripture is not silent on the relationship between the material and the spiritual. In several passages, we are told about **objects consecrated to God** (such as the Ark of the Covenant) and also about objects **associated with pagan practices**, which were to be destroyed.

A clear example is found in **Acts 19:19**:

“A number who had practiced sorcery brought their scrolls together and burned them publicly. When they calculated the value of the scrolls, the total came to fifty thousand drachmas.”

The attitude of the early Christians was clear: **break completely with all ties to evil, even if it meant destroying valuable possessions.**

5. How Can We Protect Ourselves from the Occult? Faith as True Armor

In a world fascinated by the supernatural, it is more urgent than ever to **return to the foundations of true spiritual protection**. We do not need salt rituals, pendulums, energy stones, or ceremonies. We have something infinitely more powerful: **the grace of God**.

Authentic Tools for Spiritual Protection:

1. **Daily prayer** (especially the Rosary)
2. **The Sacraments**: regular confession and Holy Communion in a state of grace
3. **Use of blessed sacramentals**, such as:

 5. **If necessary, destroy it**: With the clear intention of breaking any attachment.
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7. The Great Deception: Paralyzing Fear

One of the devil's greatest achievements today is not so much “possessing,” but **infusing constant fear into the hearts of believers**, making them think they are surrounded by supernatural dangers and that they must live trembling. This is a mistake.

□ Jesus said: “*Do not be afraid*” (Matthew 10:31)
