

Introduction: An Urgent Message for Our Times

Born in 1931, Agnes Sasagawa had suffered from severe health problems since her youth, including deafness that left her completely unable to hear. Despite her sufferings, she never lost trust in God. In 1969, after a failed operation left her bedridden, she had a mystical experience that led her to consecrate her life to God.



She entered the convent in 1973, and it was there, on **June 12 of that same year**, that supernatural phenomena began.

2. The Apparitions and the Virgin's Messages

First Apparition: The Angel and the Heavenly Light

Before the Virgin's arrival, Sister Agnes encountered **an angel** (later identified as her guardian angel), who prepared her for what was to come. On June 12, 1973, while praying, a brilliant light filled the chapel, and a heavenly voice spoke to her.

The Statue That Comes to Life

On July 6, 1973, the wooden statue of the Virgin Mary in the convent chapel **began to bleed from a wound on its right hand**. This phenomenon repeated several times and was witnessed by other sisters and Bishop Ito.

But the most shocking moment came when the statue itself **started shedding human tears**, a miracle that occurred **101 times** between 1975 and 1981.

The Three Key Messages of the Virgin

The Virgin delivered three main messages to Sister Agnes, all centered on:

- 1. **The urgency of prayer and penance** to avert a great punishment for humanity.
- 2. **The crisis in the Church**, with priests and religious abandoning their vocations.
- 3. The warning of a severe worldwide chastisement if humanity does not convert.

One of the most striking passages reads:

"If men do not repent and better themselves, the Father will inflict a terrible punishment on all humanity. It will be a punishment greater than the Flood, such as has never been seen before."



These words strongly echo the **Third Secret of Fatima**, which speaks of a great apostasy and suffering for the Church.

3. The Miracles of Akita: The Weeping Statue and **Healings**

The Weeping Statue: A Sign for the World

One of the most extraordinary phenomena was the wooden statue of the Virgin Mary **shedding human tears on multiple occasions**. Scientists analyzed the tears and confirmed they were **of human origin**.

This miracle was witnessed by hundreds, including Bishop Ito, who was initially skeptical but became convinced of its authenticity.

The Healing of Sister Agnes

Sister Agnes, who had been completely deaf, **miraculously regained her hearing** on May 30, 1982, after the apparitions ended. This event was seen as divine confirmation of the messages' truth.

4. Theological Meaning: Why is Akita So Important **Today?**

A Call to Conversion in Times of Crisis

Akita's message is not new: it echoes **Fatima, La Salette, and Lourdes**, where the Virgin warned of the dangers of sin and the need to return to God. But in Akita, the tone is even more urgent, reflecting the gravity of our times.

The Connection to the Crisis in the Church

The Virgin mentions in her messages:



"The devil will infiltrate even the Church in such a way that cardinals will oppose cardinals, bishops against bishops."

These words seem to predict the **doctrinal confusion and divisions** affecting the Church today.

The Rosary and the Eucharist: Spiritual Weapons

As in all her apparitions, the Virgin at Akita insists on:

- Praying the Rosary daily.
- Adoring and defending the Eucharist.
- Offering penance for sinners.

5. How to Live the Message of Akita Today

- 1. Take the call to conversion seriously. Live in grace, go to confession frequently, and avoid sin.
- 2. **Pray the Rosary every day.** The Virgin promised at Akita that this prayer can stop wars and calamities.
- 3. Adore Jesus in the Eucharist. Akita reminds us that God is truly present in the Consecrated Host.
- 4. **Do penance.** Offer sacrifices for the salvation of souls.

Conclusion: An Ultimatum of Love

Our Lady of Akita does not come to frighten us, but to **love and save us**. Her tears are a sign of her sorrow for a humanity that turns away from God, but also of her mercy.

In a world where many deny God, where the Church suffers divisions, and where evil seems to advance, **Akita is a beacon of hope**. The Virgin tells us: "Do not fear. I am here to help you."
