Join us on this journey through the seven most important Catholic pilgrimages in the world, each with its own history, message, and special grace for those who undertake them.

1.	Rome a	and Vatican	City	(Italy) -	The Heart	of Catholicism

☐ **Sanctuary:** St. Peter's Basilica and the Major Basilicas

☐ **Key date:** Throughout the year, especially during Holy Years

Rome is the ultimate pilgrimage destination for Catholics, as it is the seat of the Pope and the place where the apostles St. Peter and St. Paul were martyred. Among the most visited sacred sites are:

- St. Peter's Basilica, which houses the tomb of St. Peter.
- St. John Lateran Basilica, the cathedral of Rome.
- St. Paul Outside the Walls, the burial site of St. Paul.
- The Holy Stairs, which, according to tradition, were brought from Pontius Pilate's praetorium.

During Holy Years (Jubilees), pilgrims can obtain a plenary indulgence by passing through the Holy Door of the four major basilicas.

2. Santiago de Compostela (Spain) - The Apostle's Way

☐ **Sanctuary:** Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela ☐ **Key date:** July 25 (Feast of St. James the Apostle)

The Camino de Santiago is one of the oldest and most revered pilgrimages in Christianity. Since the Middle Ages, millions of pilgrims have walked its routes to venerate the tomb of St. James the Greater, the patron saint of Spain.



The most popular routes include:

- The French Way (starting from the Pyrenees)
- The Portuguese Way (from Lisbon or Porto)
- The Northern Way (following the Cantabrian coast)

Reaching the Cathedral of Santiago and attending the Pilgrim's Mass, where the famous botafumeiro is swung, is the highlight of this pilgrimage.

3. The Holy Land (Israel and Palestine) – Following the Footsteps of Je

☐ **Sanctuary:** Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Nazareth, Mount Sinai

☐ **Key date:** Holy Week and Christmas

Pilgrimage to the Holy Land is one of the most profound experiences for a Christian, as it allows one to walk the very places where Jesus lived, died, and resurrected. Some of the holiest sites include:

- The Church of the Holy Sepulchre (site of Christ's crucifixion and resurrection)
- The Via Dolorosa, tracing the path of the Passion
- The Basilica of the Nativity in Bethlehem
- The Mount of Olives and Gethsemane
- The Sea of Galilee and Mount Tabor

The Holy Land is known as "the Fifth Gospel," as visiting these places helps deepen one's understanding of the Bible and strengthen faith.

4. Lourdes (France) - The Sanctuary of the Sick

☐ **Sanctuary:** Basilica of Our Lady of Lourdes

☐ **Key date:** February 11 (Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes)

Lourdes is the most visited Marian shrine in Europe, where the Virgin Mary appeared in 1858 to St. Bernadette Soubirous. Mary revealed the presence of a miraculous spring, where thousands of pilgrims have found physical and spiritual healing.



A pilgrimage to Lourdes includes:

- Praying the Rosary at the Grotto of the Apparitions
- Participating in the nightly candlelight processions
- Bathing in the miraculous waters of the spring

This shrine is especially visited by the sick and disabled, who seek comfort in the Virgin's presence.

5. Fatima (Portugal) – The Call to Pray the Rosary

☐ **Sanctuary:** Shrine of Our Lady of Fatima

☐ **Key date:** May 13 and October 13

In 1917, the Virgin Mary appeared to three shepherd children (Lucia, Jacinta, and Francisco) in Fatima, calling humanity to conversion, penance, and prayer of the Rosary. During the last apparition, the famous "Miracle of the Sun" took place, witnessed by over 70,000 people.

Pilgrims in Fatima participate in:

- The recitation of the Rosary at the Chapel of the Apparitions
- The candlelight procession
- The veneration of the tombs of the shepherd children

Fatima is a major center of devotion, particularly associated with the consecration of Russia to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

6. Guadalupe (Mexico) - The Sanctuary of the Americas

☐ Sanctuary: Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe

☐ **Key date:** December 12 (Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe)

The Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe is the most visited Catholic pilgrimage site in the world after the Vatican. In 1531, the Virgin appeared to St. Juan Diego on Tepeyac Hill, leaving her miraculous image on his tilma (cloak).



Each year, millions of pilgrims come to venerate the image, which has withstood the passage of time and destructive attacks.

Devotees participate in:

- Masses and processions at the Basilica
- Praying before Juan Diego's tilma
- Penitential walks from various points in Mexico

Our Lady of Guadalupe is the Patroness of Latin America, and her message remains relevant: unity, conversion, and trust in God.

7. Czestochowa (Poland) - The Black Madonna

☐ **Sanctuary:** Jasna Góra Monastery ☐ **Key date:** August 15 (Feast of the Assumption)

The shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa is the spiritual heart of Poland. The image of the Black Madonna, according to tradition, was painted by St. Luke the Evangelist and brought to Poland in the 14th century.

Every year, thousands of pilgrims travel on foot in the *Pielgrzymka Warszawska* (Warsaw Pilgrimage), covering more than 200 km in prayer.

The shrine is a symbol of resistance and faith, especially during wars and communist persecution.

Pilgrimages are not mere journeys but paths of conversion. At each sanctuary, the Virgin Mary and the saints remind us that our true destination is Heaven.
