



“And behold, there was a great earthquake, for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled back the stone and sat on it.” (Matthew 28:2)

These words from the Gospel of St. Matthew contain one of the deepest and least-discussed mysteries of Christ's Resurrection: **the earthquake that shook the earth at the precise moment Jesus emerged from the tomb.** This was no mere natural phenomenon—it was a cosmic sign, creation itself roaring at the definitive triumph of Life over death.

The angel sitting on the stone (Matthew 28:2) is a striking image: **it symbolizes heaven's dominion over death.** No more barriers—the tomb has been conquered.
