Matthew, writing for Jewish converts, presents Jesus as the *Messiah King*, the fulfillment of Old Testament promises.

Key Aspects of Matthew’s Gospel:

- **Jesus as the New Moses:** Just as Moses gave the Law on Sinai, Jesus proclaims the *New Law* in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5–7).



- **The Kingdom as Central Theme:** From the first chapter (Matthew 1:1, where Jesus is called “Son of David”) to the Great Commission (Matthew 28:18–20), everything points to the establishment of His Kingdom.
 - **The Beatitudes as the “Constitution of the Kingdom”:** In Matthew 5, Jesus outlines the values of the Kingdom: humility, mercy, purity of heart.
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3. The Kingdom of God vs. The Kingdoms of the World

Today, we live in a culture that idolizes power, material success, and self-sufficiency. But the Kingdom of God reverses this logic:

- “*The last will be first*” (Matthew 20:16).
- “*Whoever wants to be great must become a servant*” (Matthew 20:26).
