2. **The blood is of type AB:** This blood type is the same found in the Shroud of Turin and other Eucharistic miracles. Additionally, it is a common type among populations in the Middle East, where Jesus was born.
3. **The tissue and blood are incorrupt:** Despite more than 1,300 years having passed, the samples show no signs of natural decomposition, something inexplicable from a scientific perspective.
4. **The exact proportion of blood globules:** Although the five globules vary in size, each weighs exactly the same—a detail that defies the laws of physics and underscores the supernatural nature of the miracle.



Theological Significance

The Miracle of Lanciano is not merely an extraordinary event; it is God's call to rediscover the profound meaning of the Eucharist. The Church teaches that in every Mass, the bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ, even if our senses perceive otherwise. This miracle helps us understand that faith in the Real Presence is not an abstract idea but a living and tangible reality.

St. John Paul II, in his encyclical *Ecclesia de Eucharistia*, emphasized that the Eucharist is a **"mystery of faith"** that can only be fully embraced with the eyes of the heart. The Miracle of Lanciano, like other Eucharistic miracles, invites us to overcome our doubts and confidently enter into this mystery of love.
