"I saw my particular judgment. I saw Jesus as a just Judge, but also as a merciful Savior. Everything I had done passed before my eyes with terrible clarity. But Jesus told me: 'Do not fear, My daughter, I am with you.'" (Diary, 36)

#### The Third Day and Divine Mercy

St. Faustina recounts that many souls, on the third day, experience a special manifestation of God's Mercy. It is a moment when:

- The soul sees its entire life with absolute clarity.
- It understands the weight of its sins and the depth of God's love.
- If in mortal sin, it suffers spiritual agony before condemnation.
- If in a state of grace, it feels indescribable joy as it approaches Heaven.

She also mentions that the prayers of the living, especially the Rosary and the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, can assist souls at this critical time.

## 3. Padre Pio and the Souls in Purgatory

Padre Pio, known for his stigmata and deep union with the souls in Purgatory, had numerous supernatural encounters with the deceased. Many testimonies reveal that:

- Souls would appear to him asking for prayers, especially on the third day.
- He physically felt their sufferings and offered Masses for them.
- He witnessed how some souls, thanks to prayers, were quickly released.



In a letter, he wrote:

"The souls in Purgatory cannot pray for themselves, but they eagerly await our prayers. Every Mass, every Hail Mary, is a ray of light drawing them closer to God."

### Why Is the Third Day So Crucial?

According to Padre Pio, the third day is when many souls fully grasp their state and feel most intensely the need for purification. It is a time when the Church Militant (those of us on Earth) can powerfully intercede through:

- Masses offered for their repose.
- The praying of the Holy Rosary.
- Acts of charity done in their name.

## 4. How to Prepare for the Soul's Judgment

The message of the mystics is clear: death is not the end, but the beginning of our **true life.** Yet, we must be prepared.

## **Keys to a Favorable Particular Judgment**

- 1. **Frequent Confession**: The Sacrament of Reconciliation cleanses the soul.
- 2. **Eucharistic Communion**: Jesus in the Eucharist strengthens us.
- 3. **Prayer for the dead**: They will help us later if we help them now.
- 4. Living in grace: Avoiding mortal sin and cultivating virtue.

## What Will Happen to You on the Third Day?

If you live in friendship with God, that day will be one of **peace and hope**. If not, it will be a moment of **terrible clarity**. But God's Mercy is always available... until the very last instant.



## **Conclusion: A Message of Hope**

Death should not frighten us, but it should motivate us to live in grace. The revelations of St. Faustina and Padre Pio remind us that:

- God is a Just Judge, but also a Merciful Father.
- Our prayers can save souls.
